ohn Perozzi, 92, had not been to Normandy since he arrived by parachute on June 6, 1944. On the 68th anniversary of the D-Day invasion, he stood in the rain on a narrow street in Ste. Mère-Eglise and soaked it all in. "I am so impressed with the people and the way they rebuilt their town ... so many happy faces," he said, displaying a chest full of medals, including his newest, the French Legion of Honor, which he received during this year's anniversary activities in France. "I am very proud and blessed that I could come here."

The New Jersey veteran was among many notable figures who joined American Legion National Commander Fang Wong and American Legion Auxiliary National President Kris Nelson in honoring the invasion's memory and those who gave their lives in the march to victory.

Others who visited France included Secretary of the Army John McHugh and Lt. Gen. Mark Hertling, commanding general of the U.S. Army Europe and the 7th Army, as well as Brig. Gen. Alan Stolte of the U.S. Army Civil Affairs & Psychological Operations Command (Airborne), and hundreds of active-duty troops from the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado and duty stations around the world.
